Watch out for a magazine called TV Sci Fi Monthly, price 35p. The first issue came out at the beginning of March. This was full of STAR TREK material, including a colour picture of Spock on the cover and a marvellous colour poster of the Enterprise as centrefold.

This article was sparked off by the excellent new book "Star Trek Lives" by Jacqueline Lichtenberg, Sondra Marshak and Joan Winston, and more particularly by Chapter 4 - The Spock Charisma Effect. It is one of the best accounts of Spock, and Spock's sexual attraction, that I have ever read, and yet for me it was somehow incomplete. I have seen many good articles on this subject, but I have never seen an article expressing the reasons for Spock's non-attraction which, after all, equally says something about the character. And I am sure that there must be many others who like me are not sexually turned on by Spock.

"Not turned on" is not the same as "turned off" of course. Perhaps a very few may feel repulsion at Spock's seeming coldness, perhaps even at his alien origins (though if this holds true for more than a tiny percentage we have obviously much mistaken the nature of a STAR TREK fan). No, it is deeper and more complex than that. Nor is it due to a misunderstanding or underestimation of the character of Mr. Spock.

I like, admire and respect Spock. Having had a troublesome early childhood myself during which I was made to feel so different that I used to refuse to leave the house, I have no trouble in identifying with Spock's isolation, and I admire the incredible inner strength with which he copes. I agree with everything said about him in Chapter 4. His integrity, strength and uncompromising morality are virtues of which I'm well aware; his IDIC philosophy is dear to me; his love for Kirk is high on the list of his innumerable axcellent qualities; and his sharp intellect is an attraction in itself. Undeniably he has that magic that we call charisma. Why then, whenever I think of Spock, do I feel a resigned sedness? Because for me, Spock is a tragic hero. When I think of Spock I think not of his strength but of his weakness and vulnerability. He may be an admirable man but the price he has paid is too high, and even more tragic, it is a needless price. One does not have to sacrifice emotion for logic, and I pity Spock's inability to express his feelings. In my short life I have already found that men who are reticent and undemonstrative are difficult to cope with and are more likely to be emotionally "damaged" than those who openly express themselves. Consider, for example, how much hurt McCoy has unknowingly inflicted on Spock. And here I disagree with the three authors. The last scene of "Requiem for Methuselah" is indeed a moving and tragic one, but part of that tragedy belongs to McCoy. I don't think that McCoy fails to understand Spock, I think he simply forgets in the strength of his own feelings. McCoy is a doctor - he is used to curing Kirk's body when it is hurt. He is a lso a friend who is used to "Curing", or at least helping, Kirk's feelings when they are hurt. Here, when Kirk needs him the most, he can do nothing. He doesn't really mean "I wish he could forget", what he means is "I wish I could make him forget". In his frustration he lashed out at the negrest thing - Spock. It is a very human failing. And if Spock's weakness is that he cannot show emotion, McCoy goes to the other extreme and expresses his emotions to the point of total disregard for another's feelings.

Which brings us back to the basic idea that "reason and emotion are enemies". I agree with Myrna Culbreath - that it is a mistaken premise. But I believe that this problem can be applied to, and resolved by, the three major characters. Consider their positions on the bridge. In almost every episode, at some time or other, we have Kirk in the command chair with Spock on one side, and McCoy on the other. Technically it's an excellent filming position. Isn't it also symbolic? How does Kirk make a decision after all? He considers the facts, listens to the advice of his senior officers, and then he alone decides. And the advice? On his right hand he

has Spock, advising cool, clear, logical reasoning. On his left he has McCoy, often with wildly opposing views, highly coloured by emotion. And Kirk is squarely in the middle. He sits between Reason and Emotion. His delicate position as Starship Captain demands a logical approach to a problem. He must face facts, however unpleasant. His delicate position as a human being demands that he feels - and he cannot completely block out emotion from his decisions. He cannot help but blend the two "opposing" views.

Almost everything that has ever been theorised about Kirk's attraction holds true for me. The loneliness of a command position; his own brand of integrity, morality and intelligence heightened by hunches; his power; his humour; and his ability to show his feelings to a woman without worrying about being thought "soft" comes very near the top of the list, as you might suspect from the gist of this article. But at the very top comes this unique blending of reason and emotion. While sharing McCoy's feelings, he utilises Spock's logic. And that requires a very special strength. No wonder the poor man cracks up at times.

To many female fans, I agree, the prospect of succeeding with Spock where others have failed is a challenge. Caught up with this motive is the imaginary thrill of a savage attack. Normally both these motives would be true for me too, with a <a href="https://www.male.com/ma

Wild, mock savagery, behind which lies a tender regard for one's partner, is a very different thing from a true bestial savagery of a kind which blots out everything else. In Amok Time Spock fears what he knows is to come. Is that fear derived purely from the knowledge that his reason will be ripped from him? Or is it, at least partially, the fear of knowing what he will do? Consider his solicitous regard of Nurse Chapel. Everyone talks about before and during Pon Farr, well, what about after it? How would Spock react to a woman whom he knows he has "raped"? A Vulcan woman is trained to cope with this aspect, I presume. How would Nurse Chapel and the scores of other willing females cope? To imagine that once Spock has become open to them sexually, he will automatically become open to them emotionally, is unrealistic. He would, in all probability, be even more closed.

There is one further point that I have never seen discussed. To what extent is our attraction to a character based on the physical attraction of the actor who portrays him? From the depth of the discussions on sexual attraction it is obvious that this in not the major criterion. On the other hand, how many fans do you know who prefer a particular character but one of the other actors?

I seem to be the only one who likes the animals in the crew of the animations. I don't know how I would react if I met Arex unexpectedly - I hope naturally! And meeting an English-speaking feline would fill me with delight, even if she were red - but then, I love cats!

I can understand Linda's dislike of 'Turnabout Intruder'. What luck (?)! I like the idea of a 'Worst episode' poll. Here's my entry - 'Omega Glory'. To me it is just too nationalistic and somewhat contrary to the ideals of S.T.. It just 'turns me off'. A Close second is 'The Children Shall Lead' - for no logical reason, it's just blank.

I was thinking S.T.A.G. might like to try a 'favorite scene type poll'. My vote goes to that scene in 'Tribbles' between Scotty and Kirk after the altercation in the bar with the Klingons. In particular the very end of it when Kirk restricts Scotty to quarters and Scotty replies 'Thank you. It'll give me a chance to catch up on my technical journals'. Kirk has such a beautiful pained expression.

Well, what is <u>your</u> favourite scene? Mine is also from 'Tribbles', one of the scenes the B.B.C. cut so that I've only seen it once. It's the scene in sickbey between Spock and McCoy where McCoy says he likes the tribbles better than he likes Spock, and Spock gets the last word by saying, 'Indeed, they have one saving grace - they do not talk too much'.

Does <u>enybody</u> like 'The Children Shall Lead'? If you do, why not write to tell us why? As far as most of the other episodes go, I've heard at least one person say, 'I like it; it's not my favourite but it's all right.' But to date I haven't heard one person defend 'The Children Shall Lead.' Is there anyone who loves Cinderella?

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Many thanks to Dorothy Bradley who sent me Log 6 and STAR TREK - The New Voyages when they came out in the States at the beginning of March. Log 6 contains Albatross, Practical Joker and How Sharper Than a Serpent's Tooth.

New Voyages, edited by Sondra Marshak and Myrna Culbreath, consists of eight fan-written stories, several of which had already appeared in zines in America. Each story has a short introduction by one of the actors.

Ni Var by Claire Gabriel Is one of those which has been printed before. I hadn't read it although I'd heard a lot about how good it was. On the first reading, I was slightly disappointed, but on rereading it a couple of times I found it had grown on me, and I would in fact agree that it is extremely good.

Intersection Point by Juanita Coulson I had already read. I don't <u>dislike</u> it, but neither do I like it. I don't fault the writing or the development of the story, I just can't accept a story in which the Enterprise is seriously damaged by colliding with 'nothing'.

The Enchanted Pool by Marcia Ericson. This is another one that does nothing for me. Objectively, I can say, nicely written, well worth inclusion on several counts - but it doesn't turn me on.

. Visit to a Weird Planet Revisited by Ruth Berman I had also read before. This story is fantasy in that Messrs. Shatner, Nimoy and Kelley are accidentally beamed aboard the Enterprise and have to act as Kirk, Spock and McCoy rather successfully, too. It definitely appeals to me.

The Face on the Barroom Floor by Ruth Berman and Eleanor Arnason is another one I had read. I can't <u>really</u> believe that Kirk would ever get involved in a barroom brawl...but again, I like it.

The Hunting by Doris Beetem I did not like, and for the same reason that Anok Time isn't one of my favourite episodes. I can't believe the Vulcans would do anything so illogical as maintain ancient traditions. I think they would be one of the most up-to-date races in the Galaxy. Even though Spock finds a reason for maintaining this tradition, I don't even find the story very well developed. Sorry, Doris, but...not for me.

The Winger Dreamers by Jennifer Guttridge is the last of the ones I'd already read. I like it although it isn't my favourite of Jennifer's stories. Nicely thought out, nicely developed, well worth including - but I still prefer her 'In the Maze'.

Mind Sifter by Shirley Maiewski. Shirley likes to separate Kirk from the others and then put him in a terrible psychological position to bring out his strength of character, and this story is no exception. It is a marvellous story - though I was left with one unanswered question. For two years, Spock was in command of the Enterprise - but there was no mention of his having a First Officer...

The book finishes with Sonnet from the Vulcan - Omicrom Ceti 111 Shirley Meech. A very moving little poem.

My three favourite stories are Ni Var, Winged Dreamers, and Mind Sifter, with Ruth Berman's two not far behind. Copies should by coming in to 'Dark They Were and Golden-eyed in London and the Andromeda Book Co. Ltd, 57 Summer Row Birminghah - I've been told that both have it on order.

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THE STAR TREK ANIMATIONS

After reading about Gene Roddenberry's problems with Mr. Spock I find it rather amusing/surprising that two other aliens should be introduced into the series. (I must admit that I would like to see Lt. M'Ress in a live action version.)

I think that, with the live action series the actors were able to pull up a not very good story and make it at least interesting, but with animations this is not possible. This means that the stories have to be good to start with; however in 22 minutes this is going to be very difficult to maintain. It would be very interesting is someone would write "The Making of the Animated STAR TREK" so that the problems and difficulties met with in the production of the live action and animated versions could be compared. (Any volunteers?)

From talking to people who are not STAR TREK fans as such but do watch the programme (yes, such creatures do exist!) I gather that the response to the animations has not been as good as the response to the live action version. However since my survey (?) was carried out while I was working in an office and most of the people I asked were female it could merely be the absence of William Shatner, Leonard Nimoy and the rest of the cast in the flesh!

One thing which surprised me, I had read the 'Log One' book before I saw the episodes and I was pleased by the way Alan Dean Foster had kept to the programme. What did not please was the introduction by the original writer of several pieces of equipment which were not in the original series. (Like the Bridge Defence System and the Life Support Belts.)
