The DAILY MAIL, Jan 17th printed an article saying that William Shatner has signed to do a TV film of STAR TREK and that several of the other stars, like Leonard Nimoy, are being talked to. The article indicates that there will be a number of episodes running 2 hours each, and that we can expect to see the new ST on British TV next year. Work is to start on the TV film in three months. The article also states that ST-TMP has so far earned 170 million dollars and is still making money for Paramount.

I'm afraid that all we can tell you at the moment is that we have heard that William Shatner has signed to do a TV movie of STAR TREK but that the movie will be released at the cinema outside the States.

"JIM KIRK GETS KILLED" (?)

We mentioned in the last newsletter: about the article which said that Kirk gets killed off in Vonda N. McIntire's STAR TREK novel which will be released by Pocket Books in June. Here is a letter reprinted from the William Shatner Fan Fellowship Newsletter, The Center Seat Vol 1, No. 5, which sets things straight.

Dear Sonni, I'm sorry that the misquotation in the AP news story about my Star Trek novel has caused

people so much consternation.

What I actually said in the interview was, "I enjoyed writing The Entrophy Effect tremendously. All sorts of things happen in it. Mr. Sulu meets the new head of security, and is very much attracted to her. Mr. Spock has to save the universe. And Captain Kirk gets killed on page 113 of the manuscript. I don't want to mislead you -- this is a series novel, and in a series novel all main characters have to be pretty much the same at the end of the story as they were in the beginning. But in the context of the book, Jim Kirk dies about a third of the way through, and no one is pretending." Or words to that effect.

Unfortunately, all that got into print -- maybe all the reporter chose to hear -- was "Jim Kirk

gets killed."

As you've probably guessed, I still don't want to give away the plot of the book. But I think -- I hope -- that despite the misunderstanding, people who read it when it comes out in June will feel that I've treated both readers and characters fairly.

THE NEW ENTERPRISE MODEL

Last N/L we printed the first part of an article by Barry Naxwell on the new model. In this part, Barry talks about painting the model.

For more ambitious modellers, I suggest that the rear-most 'windows' on the Primary Hull are left unlit, the bulbs from these being passed through the holes in the centre of the upper and lower parts of the hull. The Bridge and Sensor array (parts 3 & 5 respectively) should then be coated on the inside with several thin layers of white paint (black tends to show through the plastic) and cemented over the bulbs. When switched on, the lights now shine through the windows and out of the slits provided in parts 3 & 5 across the hull, resulting in a similar lighting effect to that seen in the movie.

Should it be decided not to light the model, it is best to back the 'windows' with plasticard painted black to add depth to an otherwise hollow model.

The kit is complete with two sets of transfers, one of the self-adhesive variety that provides detailing for the warp nacelles, photon torpedo tubes and impulse drive; of a refractive material, these are most effective when seen under electric light. The second set is of the rub-down type and provides the Starfleet/UFP flashes, ships name and construction number, botanical section windows and docking-port flashes. Combined, these add the finishing touches to an unpainted model and make it a fine display piece.

For those who wish to detail the kit farther, a full, if somewhat dubious, painting guide is provided in the instructions. On reading these and comparing them with the photo on the box and with some photos and posters of the movie Enterprise, I decided to ignore these completely and after some thought came up with two alternate methods of painting the kit, both of which are highly effective.

Firstly, there is some doubt as to the actual colour of the Enterprise. In the film, she appears at various times as sea-blue, pale blue, silver, off-white or white. (I have photos/posters depicting all these colours!) while in the series she appeared off-white. The kit itself is moulded in this latter colour, and I used this as a basis for my first colour scheme.

Leaving the majority of the kit in its original colour, I painted the emergency flush intakes, emergency flush vents, space-energy/matter sinks (at front of nacelles), the semi-oval magnatomic flux construction first stage (sides of nacelles), photon torpedo tube exhaust and flush venting under the impulse drive black, while also painting the tube mounting (part 10) and the back of the impulse drive black, because the decals that are placed on these are not quite large enough to cover them. The hangar deck doors were then painted gloss white. Although simple, this gives a highly displayable model without resorting to complicated colour schemes.

However, for those of a more artistic mein (and who possess an airbrush) the following might be attempted: airbrush all parts of kit silver-fox. When dry, highlight the following in matt black - emergency flush intakes and vents (warp drive pylons), space-energy/matter sinks, magnatomic flux construction first stage, photon tubes and exhaust, impulse drive (back of part 7) and drive flush vent (under impulse mounting, on sides of interconnecting dorsal) and the inside of docking ports. Then drybrush the magnatomic amplification crystals (top of nacelles) and impulse deflection crystals medium blue; the concave face of the navigational deflector (part 15) gloss white; the running lights red (port) and green (starboard). The navigational domes on parts 3 & 5 can then be painted natural silver and the eight small vents in part 5 black. For an additional detail, all formation lights and navigational lights can be painted yellow.

Using the lighting method already described and suitable soft background lighting, this latter scheme is really lifelike and well worth the trouble of reproducing. In both cases, all painting should be done before any construction work is undertaken, and the paint removed from the surfaces to be bonded.

As a final note: the kit's other major failing is the display stand. For some reason, and despite the increase in size of the actual model, AMT have included the stand originally provided for the older kit. Due to the additional size and weight of the new Enterprise, extreme strain is thrown upon the base of the arm of the stand where it joins the base and so it is essential to ensure that these two are well bonded before attempting to mount the Enterprise on the stand. A stiff wire support running vertically from the top of the base to the inside face of the top of part 27 also helps to alleviate the strain. When actually mounting the Enterprise, due to her increased weight, it is necessary to hold, or rather press her into a position on the stand while the cement dries in order to secure a safe and accurate bond. It is best to hold the kit for 20 - 30 minutes in order to ensure a really secure bond. The stand is adequate, adding 'N.C.C. 1701 U.S.S. Enterprise' from a latraset to finish the job. Of course, one could always build one's own... Barry Maxwell.

Ian Pearce - I did not like the suggested colour for the model - white. To me, the film and the posters, Fotonovel, etc, showed the colour as being a medium blue-grey. I set about mixing a suitable imitation, using the Humbrol matt black, matt white and gloss light blue. I can't give you any idea of the proportions as I soon lost track of how much of what I put in the jar! You have to work by ear - or rather, eye.

A coat of paint was applied with a spray gun before assembly. If you have a spray gun, I suggest you use it; it makes it easier to paint such a large surface, and also gives a far

superior finish.

At the end of each construction stage, any paintwork damaged during construction was repaired

and left to dry thoroughly before starting the next.

After the assembly was completed, the other colours were added. I painted the emergency flush vents on the nacelle pylons Humbrol medium grey, and the vents on leading and trailing edges of the pylons matt black. The 'fins' at the end of the nacelles (not the intercoolers) were painted Lirfix slate grey. So too were the other dark areas around the black vents on the pylons and the dark areas on the connecting dorsal. The end cap of the secondary hull also appears to be this colour. The navigation deflector (the front of the end cap) was finally painted a very pale blue, fading to a darker blue near the edges. The dark areas on top of the primary hull (around the bridge windows) were painted slate grey, so were the odd penels on the lower halves of the primary hull. There are two dark lines around the edge of the primary hull, top and bottom of the windows as well as one in between. These were painted one at a time, using a lot of sellotape to mask the surrounding paintwork. The windows on the secondary hull were painted, some pale yellow, some black. The next step is to add the running and formation lights. These are located at the after end of the nacelles, on top; above the shuttlecraft hangar; under the fantail cove on the moulded bulge; underneath the secondary hull just forward of the stand slot; either side of the impulse engine fairing on top of the primary hull; above the docking port on top of the primary hull; at the leading edge of the primary hull, lower half (bow light); above the moulded navigation lights on the port and starboard sides of the primary hull; lower part of the leading edges of the nacelles. The 'lights' are small, shaped bits of sprue, cemented into place and painted.

If approached with care, the model should be very rewarding, though I wouldn't recommend it

for beginners.

ANOTHER DOOR OPENS...

Some months ago I had an operation on my feat for osteoarthritis and due to the curiosity of the surgeon was given an extensive bone scan for further arthritis. The results were pretty bad and apart from being recommended for further surgery involving my spine, hips and knees, was told to seriously consider giving up nursing altother. Apparently an accident that I had when I was 24 set up some sort of chemical reaction in my bones so they have aged faster. Can you imagine how I felt? My mursing profession means a great deal to me, and having enjoyed it for 15 years, I imagined at least another 20 years in it. I started to get depressed; there was nothing else I wanted to do, or could do. Then a friend suggested that my interest in calligraphy might be useful. I was introduced to calligraphy by Bjo Trimble during my visit to the States last year. After a lot of practice in Gothic and Roman lettering. I have been offered the opportunity of illustrating the use of calligraphy for slide shows. The opportunity has been given to me by a commercial photography firm. This is not a full-time job yet as I need more practice and experience, but...it is a beginning into a realm of creativity I had never considered before. Next a nursing colleague told me about a job for computer programming. I knew nothing about computers...now I am learning how a computer works, feeding it information, learning to read the codes etc... Sonni Cooper is also in frequent touch with me and is, in spite of her busy life, very encouraging with her letters. She is trying to find out more about arthritis for me, with regard to diet and exercise. Bill Shatner's wife, Marcy, had arthritis in her knee and managed to get rid of it, so I don't see why I shouldn't try! I suppose what I am trying to say is that I thought my life was over, because my love of nursing goes very deep and I couldn't bear the thought of giving it up, and yet... When one door is shut other people, like Trekkers, Bjo and Sonni, can often help push other doors open, or at least give me enough belief in myself to try. I want to thank everyone for the encouragement I have received to try new things.

AN ALTERNATIVE ON THE EDGE OF FOREVER...

This article has been written in an attempt to make a more fair analysis of Harlan Elllison's notorious version of 'City on the Edge of Forever', in particular, in reference to the article by Lee Owers that appeared in N/L 44. A substantial proportion of that article is devoted to berating Ellison for factual inaccuracies and faulty character delineation in relation to aired ST prior to the 'City' episode. Although it is my intention to show Ellison's version to be a bad script, I assert that it is so on the grounds of poor writing and inferior plotting. It is not fair to criticise on the grounds that Lee Owers chooses, because when Ellison was asked to write the script, he could not possibly have known all the facts that he has been castigated for not knowing.

It is clear from Ellison's introduction to his script that he was asked to write it when the show had just been given the go-ahead by the network (1). No episode had as yet been filmed. There is nothing odd about this - the producer of any new show naturally wishes to keep as far ahead of transmission date as possible. When Fred Freiberger took over as third season producer, a substantial proportion of the stories were already commissioned and in various stages of completion (2). There is no reason to believe things were any different for the first season, in fact it would have been more crucial to meet the deadlines for a new series. All a writer asked to write for the show would have received was a 'concept' such as Gene had used to sell the series, or, at the most, the first draft of the writers' guide. Neither would contain all the information alluded to in Lee Owers' article: to take only the most obvious examples, firstly, even the third revision of the guide does not state that Spock's blood is green. To quote directly, it states 'yellowish complexion'. The logical assumption for anyone who had never had the opportunity to see any episodes would be that his blood is yellow. Secondly, Ellison's assumption that Spock is devoid of emotion is hardly surprising; the guide does mention Spock's hidden emotions but the paragraph that deals with the subject begins 'We now realise that Spock is capable of feeling emotion ... (Emphasis mine, third revision). There is no reference to pre-reform Vulcan at all and I doubt if the idea had occurred to Gene at such an early stage. In fact he says, 'I frankly never even thought about Spock's background when I first created the character'(3). After the first pilot, Spock had incorporated the personality of the ice-cool Number One but apart from this, nothing else was clearly defined. A similar situation existed for all the other characters. As episode succeeded episode, the characters were gradually developed in the collaboration between producer, story editor and writer. So Ellison would only have been given basic information about the characters - their names and a few facts about them - plus crucial information about the concept; the Enterprise does not land on planets, etc. This accounts for all the factual errors in Ellison's draft; the number of crewmembers, the presence of enlisted men and all the other errors to which Lee Owers draws attention. These are not serious because it is the script editor's job to correct them. They will not appear in the final shooting script if he/she does the job properly.

That characters were not fully developed is demonstrated by the decision to develop Spock's background more fully in the second season. Episodes such as 'Amok Time' and 'Journey to Babel' were produced in direct response to the requests of fans to know more about the character. Positive feedback was in operation as Gene responded to their enthusiastic letters. So the Kirk-Spock relationship was something that grew up over a period of time. That is not unusual in any new series.

For various reasons, perhaps the ones I intend to set out, Ellison's script as submitted was unacceptable. He himself says it 'was put aside for several months' (1). That may be so, or it may have been gradually revised, but it must have had to take second place to scripts that were nearer to a suitable state for filming. The pressures of the TV medium would have ensured that. To transform it into a usable acript, drastic rewriting was necessary. Some changes were introduced to reduce production costs, others to tie up loose ends and inconsistencies and still others to bring the Ellison versions of Kirk and Spock into line with the way the characters had been developed.

To turn therefore to the real weaknesses of Ellison's draft: viewed as a whole the impression is one of untidiness and a rambling plotline. It is unnecessarily expensive to produce, with a variety of sets/props that are only used for one scene, and a superfluity of speaking characters who contribute little or nothing to the plot. I will deal with each scene in order.

The Teaser is far too long, consisting of three segments and in terms of story time (as opposed to real time) extending over a period that exceeds two hours. Beckwith taunts LeBeque with the Jewels of Sound before giving him one of the drugs, the scene then segues to the bridge two hours later, and finally, LeBeque's confrontation with, and murder by

Becketth, followed by Beckwith's flight from the ship. With a little thought, a shorter and more effective sequence could have been derived from this material: for example, LeBeque nearly destroys the ship as before (end Teaser) then, Act 1 - LeBeque is sent to sickbay but goes to confront Beckwith, when his behaviour is explained - instead of being high on drugs as in Ellison's version, he is suffering from withdrawal symptoms. Beckwith greedily demands a higher price which LeBeque cannot pay and when the latter goes to tell Kirk, he is murdered. Or alternatively, he kills the pusher in a frenzy, takes the drugs and beams down in a drug-crazed state. In either case, the drug itself does not have to be the expensive creation that Ellison envisages. Since it is only used in one scene it would be more economical to use jellies or something similar. After all, the Venus drug in 'Mudd's Women' was not spectacular in appearance. The above scenarios do not indicate a personal opinion that drug pushers and addicts could be found on the Enterprise - some physical deterioration in LeBeque's condition would surely be spotted in his routine physical at least - but this is within the criteria of Ellison's script. The decision to use McCoy in the aired version does of course have two advantages, that no extra speaking actors were required, and extra involvement is induced by endangering a character for whom the audience cares.

The second expensive and unnecessary scene is the meeting with the Guardians of Forever. Apart from the background mountains and glittering city, this scene involves the use of extras who are made up to look extremely old and have elaborate hairstyles. Apart from extra labour and time for the make-up and wardrobe people, the scene is over-long and undramatic. The Guardians contribute nothing material to the plot apart from explaining the function of the time vortex, and their replacement in the aired version by a machine is both more economical and more effective. Apart from another short scene, they do not appear again - a lot of expense just to convey some information. After this, the landing party returns to the ship which is transformed. More costumes are needed here and yet another two speaking actors - the Renegade Captain and one of the Enterprise crewmen who has hitherto not spoken. Speaking actors are paid more than extras so this is more expense. Nothing is achieved in this scene either; Kirk and Spock beam down again leaving Yeoman Rand in charge of the surviving crewmen, their task - to hold the transporter room against the renegades. This situation is not resolved since we do not discover if Rand and the others survive. The only commendation for Ellison here is that in his draft, Yeoman Rand is given more courage and initiative than Uhura in the aired version (especially recalling her memorable line, "Captain, I'm frightened.")

The arrival of Kirk and Spock in the past involves another two speaking characters. The Orator is purely to show the prejudice at that time against Chinese people, something Spock is to be the recipient of, and the Janitor only appears to offer them jobs. The latter's replacement in the aired version by Edith not only eliminates this extra character, it helps to establish the relationship between herself and Kirk.

Another scene showing current attitudes to Chinese is that in the restaurant kitchen. A set has to be created here and another character, the Cook, is introduced. Again, this scene adds nothing material to the plot. Perhpas this type of scene is what Ellison had in mind when he said 'unnamed parties had leached all the humanity from the story'. (1) It is very fine to make such social comments but they should be integrated into scenes that are integral to the plot, not grafted onto it.

I have already explained the reason for the wide gulf between Ellison's versions of Kirk and Spock and their television counterparts. This does not reflect upon his abilities, but there is a serious discrepancy in the behaviour of Beckwith, purely Ellison's own invention. Although Beckwith has been shown to be self-serving, and a person who gloats over the suffering of others, or is at best indifferent to them, he attempts to save Edith. This is completely out of character. If, however, the character to travel back in time had been LeBeque the addict, as suggested in one of the alternative scenarios I have set out, then this action would have been more convincing. Performed by Beckwith, it is not. Here I must also disagree with Lee Owers' view that Spock would stand by and allow Kirk to doom millions by letting another save Edith. Although Spock's loyalty to Kirk is very great, I cannot envisage him sacrificing the lives of millions because of it. Even though Kirk might hate him for it, I think he would rather sacrifice their friendship with all that would cost him, in order that others might live, for the essence of Spock is surely that he is unselfish. To summarise then it is hardly surprising that Ellison's draft was not accepted, since it indicates a lack of experience of the television medium. Not only does it involve unnecessary expense, but whole scenes are incorporated which add little or nothing to plot or character development. One wonders why the option to rewrite was not offered to Ellison before the

SI office took it on - perhaps he was unavailable, or perhaps he objected to changing the

script. Either way, he declines to say. The latter would be a rather unintelligent attitude since when writing for TV, it is necessary to fit the product to what the script editor/producer requires.

In any event, the first draft is not a credible production for a talented writer, but not for the reasons that Lee Owers puts forward. Her review is based on the assumption that Ellison knew all about the series; if that were true, her opinions would be valid. But since Ellison wrote his script when the series was just being developed, they are not.

In fact, it appears that Harlan Ellison did rewrite the script - several times - before Gene finally produced his version of it. The Trouble With Tribbles by David Gerrold, pages 154 - 155, gives details.

I am disappointed that neither Lee nor Pam has mentioned one scene from the end of Ellison's script which to my mind shows a cruelty that was never a part of Star Trek. In this scene, Beckwith tries to escape once more by jumping back into the Time Vortex - and is seen, caught forever in a recurring nova; he appears, screams in anguish and vanishes, over and over... Sheila.

Hello again. This does not apply to the Klingons in THE TROUBLE WITH TRIBBLES. However, other Vietnam allegories include episodes like A TASTE OF ARMAGEDDON. There is a lot of Vietnam in ST, seasons 1 & 2 (in 3 Fred tended to be very pro-government, and typical pro-American, with stories like THE WAY TO EDEN, etc.).

COMMENTS

Personal views expressed here and in articles in the N/L are those of various members and are not necessarily representative of those of the STAG committee.

Lorraine Hingley - There was plenty for everyone (in the N/L) and I must say you always put forward a very fair point of view. I wholeheartedly support yourself and Janet with your view that you are entitled to put what you want in the newsletter... The front cover was an absolute knockout - what a beautiful, fine drawing of Spock, Kirk and McCoy. The inside photos were marvellous too. Was the one of Scotty, McCoy and Kirk laughing a blooper?

No, in fact it wasn't. That photo was from the end of Wolf in the Fold; Scotty and McCoy are high on tranquilliser and Kirk in high spirits. Sheila.

John Roberts - The front cover of N/L 44 is excellent - could this be a permenent thing? (Maybe a drawing similar but in the old uniforms).

Every now and again we are asked something similar. The difficulty is fitting everything into a N/L and still keeping the postage reasonable. By having a pictorial cover - which we would like - we would lose a page of space for news, comments and opinions; both sides, since all the pictorial pages we have had have been either professionally printed or photocopied. We don't feel we can afford the space to do it regularly - especially since there will probably be another upsurge of news now that it has been announced that a new ST film will be made soon. Janice Ross - I think the N/L has a very good balance of news and views; though personally I would like to see a few less views on the same subject and more fiction.

We try to print as many views as possible on any given subject that arises in order to give as wide a range of opinions as possible. We may not agree with someone's views, but that does not stop us printing those views (unless the letter has been sent anonymously, of course. We'll print something without giving the writer's name if they have a good reason for wishing their name to remain unpublicised, but we must know, for copyright reasons, who wrote it.) Sheila.

Vicki Carleton - I'd like to comment on the 'Tale of Two Cities' article excellently written by Lee Owers. Ellison, had his script been aired as it stood, probably wouldn't have picked up a Hugo or any other award and he should be grateful for the powers that be who had the insight to make revisions to his story. Although I'm not a script writer, I am a professional writer and I bow to the wisdom of editors who have on two occasions asked me to change some things in order for the stories to 'fit' in with their editorial policies. If all writers balked at such necessary rewrites, we'd all remain unpublished and unknown!

Mrs. M. Chowis - I support your editorial policy of 'no death' stories - it is unthinkable to lose any of the characters.

<u>Jack Clayton</u> - ...I do not want any death stories in Star Trek. Imagine if we were all to write those - there would be a very different style of Star Trek, if there were any at all. I know that, in a factory, people eventually leave, either through instant dismissal (unfair) or fair dismissal, illness or in the case of a lady, pregnancy. You may never see any one

person again at the factory and even though you may privately have been very fond of that person - maybe you have even arranged to see them in your own leisure time - that person is simply replaced by another 'carbon-based unit'. No; keep Star Trek the way it is, with happy endings.

Jean Lussman - I love Log Entries the way it is - I find that it and Repeat Missions are among my favourites. I don't want to see my heroes killed off. I've got several zines in which in many of the stories Kirk, Spock or McCoy dies, and are they ever <u>depressing</u>.

Janice Ross - I think that we have to consider the fact that all magazines, fanzines, etc, do have editorial policies, and it is your privilege to do so. Indeed it would be a sorry state of affairs if anything at all could be printed, as then there would be no quality. Having established this, the next question is, 'What is Star Trek?' Now, this is a very personal question as ST is so much to so many people. But basically, what we all enjoyed was the TV show, which was the Enterprise and her crew exploring UFP space. Therefore, any ST zines must follow this lead if they are going to be STAR TREK. Of course the ST universe involves other aliens and starships; but they are not ST without the Enterprise and should, therefore, be included in general zines, NOT specific ST zines. After all, if anyone doesn't agree with your policy, they can always produce their own zines and anyone is at liberty to read them. The same as anyone is at liberty to read Log Entries if that is their preference.

Finally, with regard to the death theme, I would like to point out a fact that none of your correspondents mentioned. Many ST fans are children under the age of 12 years; bearing this in mind I think that any stories produced by a major club like STAG should be general zines for all the family. Therefore stories glorying in death and suffering for its sake only should be put in special zines of this type and not included in general zines. I am happy to know that I could buy Log Entries and give it to my young cousin without having to censor it first. It does not need death to generate suspense, as this can be achieved by situations in which we say, "Now how on earth will they get out of that?" Suspense is, after all, the sense of not knowing and does not only apply to 'life or death' situations.

Lynette Percy - I must agree with your editorial policy re 'no death' stories. For me, Star Trek has always been the essence of the character relationships - remove a character, the relationship dies, and so does the basis of the series. It's like cutting off a leg and still trying to run the four minute mile. By all means kill someone off if you think it is necessary, but once this has been done it's not Star Trek any more; it's general science fiction, and as such should be submitted to a SF zine. I appreciate the comment that there's more than the Enterprise and the small portion of the crew we see out there, but the world of Star Trek that is presented to us is just this microcosm. I've personally only ever read one death story, and didn't enjoy it at all, although it was indeed beautifully written. Death is unavoidable, but why try to hurry it? My grandfather died very recently, so I can say from personal experience that I have not been ennobled by the experience. It's miserable, often sordid, and feels as though a part of yourself has died. Why people should want to 'cash in' on such grief I can't imagine. I know Kirk, Spock, McCoy etc, aren't real, but I wouldn't wish that sort of misery on even a fictional character. How do the writers think it will make those who've really lost loved ones feel?

Perhaps it is because we all know and accept that the characters are fictional that we can accept their surviving impossible situations. I see no point in having a continuing series without one of the foundation stories. These men represent our dream - do we really want to kill that dream and replace it with the harsh and brutal reality that is forced upon us here and now? Death will always be with us, but what's the point in including to force a hurt/comfort situation? I don't want to read for 'pleasure' what it has been my misfortune (and that of many others) to experience in reality.

I will always disagree with those advocating death stories, but will defend their right to their opinion.

We also defend the right of anyone to hold opinions differing from ours, and will print these — which of course is how this whole debate started in the first place... Sheila.

Sue Ride - On the subject of death and explicit stories - as you so rightly say, your club caters for a wide age group and I would go along with the idea of protecting the younger members from the wrong sort of material and pressures. Fans can obtain this material elsewhere if they want to read it and I don't feel there is any sort of censure on your part therefore. By not including this sort of material you are in fact providing a service for those fans who would prefer not to read it, just as the other zines cater for those who do. Perfectly democtaric, I would have thought.

Your club's principles/guidelines/aims are well set out in your flyer which you send out to prospective members, and I think it's a bit silly to expect you to print material which you find distasteful.

Mrs. S. J. Buck - What about a one-day Star Trek convention, similar to the one for B7 next year in London, for fans who can't get to Leeds? I would be willing to help with the organising.

There's no reason why anyone in the London area shouldn't organise a one-day con if they want to, although prices are liable to be high. Meantime, what about the Leonard Nimoy con being run by Carol Davies? Although not specifically ST, I imagine there will be a fair proportion of ST included. Sheila.

Ann Preece - After many years of craving news of Star Trek, it is a lovely feeling to know that there are others out there who think as I do and share the same views. That's what fandom is all about, isn't it? - a wonderful sense of belonging, knowing that there are others who understand. There are no strangers in ST fandom - we are all friends, linked to a common cause and that's what comes over so clearly in STAG.

Coral Ward - The membership has opened up a new life style for me; introducing me to new friends and enabling me to speak freely of my inner thoughts on SF and ST, having felt too shy before.

Janet Eastham - I loved ST-TMP and, while not perfect, it was as good as it could possibly be bearing in mind the production difficulties Gene Roddenberry talked about. I have no criticisims really except that I might have preferred a more obvious Kirk/Spock/McCoy relationship. I was saddened to read that Marjorie Hill, Elaine Thomson, Richard Bracewell and J. Thomson felt 'alienated' by the strange and cold appearance and atmosphere of the remodelled Enterprise - of course it was 'unfamiliar' to them, it was unfamiliar to all ST fans, but one must remember that a new approach was being made in ST-TMP and that new fans might be recruited by the updated image of ST.

With reference to the Technical Spot, which is a topic for controversy at the moment, I should like to suggest that Colin Hunter produces a sub-edition to the N/L containing technical info. Colin obviously has great enthusiasm for this aspect of ST and it would be a stame to kill this energy. In view of the difficulties with VAT etc a sub-edition would save the editors of the N/L devoting so much time and space to the complaints/pleas of Colin Hunter, David Coote, and Ray Dowsett, and would also make a Technical Spot available to those mechanically-minded members who desire a regular feature. Of course, this would involve additional postage costs etc but it might resolve the situation we have at the moment. Has anyone thought of having brooches, tiepins or the like made in the shape of the Enterprise? Or very often there are pendants advertised in US magazines - ever thought of arranging a bulk order?

For the number of brooches, etc, that we would want made, the cost would be prohibitive. Empathy has had Enterprise pendants on sale at most cons in both silver colour and gold colour. I don't know whether they have any available at the moment, but you could always try them. Shoila.

Jay Felton - I was particularly interested to see (in the N/L) that the movie model kits are now appearing. However, it's not very helpful simply telling us that things are turning up in shops 'around the country' or that 'not many shops seem to stock' an item. Which shops do, and where? It would be nice to know whether to take an extra tenner on my next flying visit to London, Birmingham or wherever to pick up a new Enterprise model.

To be honest, we usually don't know which shops and where. We know only that someone tells us that they picked up something somewhere. It's a fair bet that the big towns will have something in one of the big stores — on the other hand, we got our model Enterprises in Saltcoats, a very small town, while the biggest model shop in Glasgow was still saying they wouldn't be available until after Christmas! One shop in Dundee, as far as I have been able to discover, got in one kit each of the Enterprise, Klingon and Shuttle; at least one of the town's model shops is still waiting for it to arrive 'when it arrives'. All we can do is say that some people are finding them (or having difficulty) to warn you to keep your eyes open. Sheila.

Josic Timmins - All due praise and honour to the BBC for continuing the present series, but what a monumental gaffe they made putting 'Requiem for Methuselah' on straight after 'Paradise Syndrome.' Hardly was my hanky dry after Paradise when I was subbing into it again - this time over the sheer awfulness of Requiem. Even Shatner looked embarrassed at having to pretend he was madly in love with the wooden Reena just five minutes after meeting

her. Can't say I blame him - he'd lost his pregnant wife only a week before!

The reason he had his head in his hands at the end of the programme was because he wanted to 'forget' the whole silly episode, not his android girlfriend. Let's hope Spock was successful in his mind touch - but who would help the poor Vulcan to forget it all?

We had one letter disagreeing with our story policy since the last N/L - a letter which seemed to be more a personal attack than a comment on policy. The writer admitted writing the previous anomymous letter; although signed, this one gave no address and a check of our records showed that the name was not that of a member. We therefore suspected that this was another anonymous letter; our suspicions have since been confirmed. We think we know who wrote these letters but have not named her to anyone outside the committee - anyone therefore who thinks she is being accused can look to her own conscience.

If this person sincerely and deeply believes, as she says, in the validity of her views, she should have the courage and honesty to say so openly by signing her own name to her letters - as many of our members have done.

I also ask her to remember that much of our policy was formulated as a result of reader comment and was not forced upon our readers by any of the current editorial group of STAG. Every time we have tried to print something a little different it has been criticised by 50% or more of the people commenting on the zines on the grounds of theme, even when it has been an excellent story, well written and well developed. I am not, in any zine I put out, going to change a policy that the majority have indicated they prefer, to suit the wishes of a minority whose views of ST differ.

After all, these are the voyages of the Starship Enterprise; it is her mission to explore strange new worlds, etc. Sheila.

REVIEWS

ST-TMP VIEWMASTER. £1.75. To my mind it's not very good. There are 21 3D slides, but what they have done in most cases is put more than one shot on each 'slide' so that it ruins some shots. The Enterprise looks lovely in 3D, but they have, on what I believe to be the best slides, included small pictures of, for example, Kirk and McCoy in one corner and Decker in the other with the Enterprise in the middle. There are very few slides that haven't been treated in this way, although there is one of Kirk in his admiral's uniform which is 'untouched'! (I was very disappointed to find there weren't any close ones of him in his white top!)

Anyway, the slides go through the general story although I defy anyone who hasn't seen the film to follow it. There are captions beneath the slides as well as on the slides but these sometimes don't make sense. For instance, there is one slide which shows what is obviously the first probe from V'ger (there is a pillar of white sparks) with entirely separate shots of Scotty in one corner and on the other corner, Kirk and Decker — on the slide, it says 'Crippled starship'... Underneath the slide, it says 'Warp drive fails'... Obviously it was difficult to fit a whole film into 21 slides. Although I was very disappointed in it. I'm still glad I've got it. Jill Searle.
